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# **Understanding this User Manual**

The sections of this manual generally follow the features of your device. A robust index for features begins on page 213. Also included is important safety information beginning on page 177, that you should know before using your device. This manual gives navigation instructions according to the default display settings. If you select other settings, navigation steps may be different.

Unless otherwise specified, all instructions in this manual assume that you are starting from the Home screen. To get to the Home screen, you may need to unlock the device. For more information, see *"Securing Your Device"* on page 16.

Note: Instructions in this manual are based on default settings, and may vary from your device, depending on the software version on your device, and any changes to the device's Settings.

Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the device unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your device and any changes to the device's Settings.

## **Special Text**

In this manual, you'll find text that is set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, share quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Presents alternative options for the current feature or menu.
- Tips: Provides quick or innovative methods, or useful shortcuts.
- Important: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance.
- Warning: Brings to your attention important information to prevent loss of data or functionality, or even prevent damage to your device.

## **Text Conventions**

This manual provides condensed information about how to use your device. To make this possible, the following text conventions are used to represent frequently-used steps:

→ Arrows are used to represent the sequence of selecting successive options in procedures. For example:

"From the Home screen, touch  $\implies$  Apps  $\rightarrow$  $\clubsuit$  Settings  $\rightarrow$   $\implies$  Connections  $\rightarrow$  Wi-Fi."



Many settings use an On/Off switch. Touch the On/Off switch to turn a setting On or Off. This graphic is used to represent the On/Off switch.

# **Setting Up Your device**

Install the 4G LTE SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card, battery, and optional memory card, then charge the battery to begin using your device.

## **Back Cover**

The battery, SIM card, and optional memory card are installed under a removable cover on the back of the device.



### Removing the battery cover

 Pull up using the slot provided, while lifting the cover off the device.

### Installing the battery cover

 Align the cover and press it firmly into place, making sure it snaps into place.

Note: The battery cover is flexible. Take care to avoid bending or twisting the cover when removing and installing, to prevent damage to the cover.

### **SIM Card**

Your device uses a 4G LTE SIM (Subscriber Identity Module). The 4G LTE SIM is a small, rectangular plastic card that stores your phone number, information about your wireless service, and other information such as messages.

If you purchased your device at a Verizon Wireless store, the SIM card is activated and ready to use. If you ordered a new device, the card may need to be activated before you can use it. For more information about activating the SIM card, visit: http://www.verizonwireless.com/4GSIM.

Caution! Turn the device off before installing or removing the SIM card. Do not bend or scratch the SIM card. Take care when handling, installing, or removing the SIM card, and avoid exposing the SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt. Keep the SIM card out of reach of small children.



#### Installing the 4G LTE SIM Card

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- With the Verizon Wireless logo facing up, carefully insert the 4G LTE SIM Card into the slot, pressing gently until it locks into place.
- 3. Install the back cover.

#### Removing the 4G LTE SIM Card

- 1. Turn off the device, then remove the back cover.
- Press the 4G LTE SIM Card in gently to release the lock, then carefully slide the 4G LTE SIM Card out of the slot.
- 3. Install the back cover.

## Battery

Your device is powered by a rechargeable, standard Li-Ion battery. A Wall/USB Charger (Charging Head and USB cable) is included with the device, for charging the battery.

The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your device for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time. After the first charge, you can use the device while charging.

Warning! Use only Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

### **Battery Indicator**

The battery icon in the Status Bar shows battery power level. Before the battery becomes too low to operate, the battery icon flashes and a tone plays. If you continue using the device without charging, the device will power off.

Tip: Task Manager provides helpful information about extending battery life. For more information, see *"Task Manager"* on page 15.

### **Installing and Removing the Battery**



### Installing the battery

- 1. Remove the battery cover.
- Insert the battery into the device, aligning the gold contacts on the battery with the gold contacts in the device.
- 3. Replace the battery cover.

### **Removing the Battery**

- 1. Remove the battery cover.
- Lift the battery up and out of the device, using the slot provided.
- 3. Replace the battery cover.

### **Charging the Battery**

Your device comes with a Wall/USB Charger (charging head and USB cable) to charge your device from any 110/220 VAC outlet.

- **Note:** The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your device for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time. After the first charge, you can use the device while charging.
  - 1. Insert the USB cable into the port.



2. Connect the USB cable to the charging head, then plug the charging head into a standard AC power outlet.



3. When charging is complete, unplug the charging head from the power outlet and remove the USB cable from the device.

# **Memory Card**

Your device supports optional, removable, microSD<sup>™</sup> or microSDHC<sup>™</sup> memory cards of up to 64GB capacity (not included), for storage of music, pictures, and other files. For more information about using memory cards, see *"Memory Card"* on page 126.



## Installing a Memory Card

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- With the gold contacts facing down, slide the memory card into the slot, pushing gently until it locks into place.
- 3. Install the back cover.

## **Removing a Memory Card**

- Important! To prevent damage to data stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the device.

  - At the prompt, read the warning and select OK to continue. Wait for SD card safe to remove to appear in the Status bar and Notifications.
  - 3. Remove the back cover.
  - Gently press on the memory card to release the lock, then carefully pull the card out.
  - 5. Install the back cover.

# **Turning the Device On and Off**

### Turning the Device On

Press and hold the **Power/Lock Key** until the device vibrates and starts up.

### **Turning the Device Off**

- Press and hold the Power/Lock Key until the device vibrates and the Device Options menu displays.
- 2. At the prompt, tap Power off.

# **Your Google Account**

Your new device uses your Google account to fully utilize its Android features, including Gmail, Google Talk and the Play Store. When you turn on your device for the first time, set up a connection with your existing Google account, or create a new Google account.

Voice Mail

All unanswered calls to your device are sent to voicemail, even if your device is turned off, so you'll want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as you activate your device.

# TTY Mode

Your device is TTY-compatible, allowing you to connect a TTY device to the device's headset jack. Before you can use your device with a TTY device, you'll need to enable TTY Mode.

## Roaming

When you travel outside your home network's coverage area, your device can use roaming to acquire service on other compatible digital networks. When roaming, the  $\triangle$ **Roaming** icon displays in the Status bar.

Tip: You can set your device's roaming behavior. For more information, see *"Mobile networks"* on page 136.

During roaming, some services may not be available. Depending on your coverage area and service plan, extra charges may apply when making or receiving calls, connecting to the Internet, or using data services. Contact Verizon Wireless for more information about your coverage area and service plan.

# Task Manager

Your device can run apps simultaneously, with some apps running in the background. Use Task Manager to see which apps are running on your device, and to end running apps to extend battery life. You can also uninstall apps from your device and check memory usage.

- 1. From any unlocked screen, press and hold the **Home Key**, then select **Task manager**.
- 2. Touch the Active applications tab to view apps running on your device. Touch End, or End all to close apps.
- 3. Touch the **Downloaded** tab to view information about apps you've installed on your device. Touch **Uninstall** to remove an app from your device.
- Touch the RAM tab to display the amount of RAM (Random Access Memory) in use. Touch Clear memory to clear processes to increase available RAM.
- 5. Touch the **Storage** tab for internal system storage and SD card memory statistics.

Tip: Touch and drag your finger on the tabs to scroll the tabs.

# **Securing Your Device**

Use your device's screen lock features to secure your device.

Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the device unlocked, at the Home screen.

To set a personal screen lock, use the Screen lock option under Security settings. For more information, see *"Screen lock"* on page 144.

For other settings related to securing your device, see *"Lock screen"* on page 144.

## Locking the Device

By default, the device locks automatically when the screen times out.

– or –

Press the **Power/Lock Key**.

Tip: When the device is locked, the Emergency call feature is available on the lock screen, to allow you to make emergency calls even while the device is locked.

## **Unlocking the Device**

Unlock the device using one of the default unlock screens, or use Screen lock options for increased security.

Press the **Power/Lock Key**, then touch and drag your finger across the screen.

Tip: Special notification icons display for missed calls or new messages. Drag a missed call or message icon to view the message or call log.

# Front



Note: The Menu and Back keys illuminate when navigating through the device.

- LED indicator: displays blue when powering up, displays red when charging, green when fully charged, and red blinking when a notification has arrived.
- Light (RGB) Sensor: lets you use the ambient light level to adjust the screen brightness/contrast. This sensor decreases screen brightness in dim light.
- Earpiece: Plays sounds and automated prompts during calls.
- Proximity and Light Sensors: Detects the presence of objects, for use with motion settings, and to control the screen display, such as when you move the device away from your ear during a call. Detects ambient light when Automatic brightness is enabled, and when using the Front camera.
- 2.0 MP Front Camera: Captures pictures and video.
- Touchscreen: Provides access to all the phone's applications and features.
- Menu: Touch to display a context-sensitive menu of options for the current screen or feature. While using your device, you may notice that the Menu Key dims, but it is always available at a touch to provide a context-sensitive menu for the current screen or app (to set the touch key light duration, see "More display settings" on page 148).

- Home: Press to display the Home screen, or Lock screen if the device is locked. Press and hold to display recent applications or launch Task Manager or Google Search.
- Back: Touch to return to the previous screen or option. While using your device, you may notice that the Back Key dims, but you can always use it to return to the previous item.

# Side



- Volume Key: From the Home screen, press to adjust master volume. During calls or media playback, press to adjust volume.
   Press to mute the ringtone of an incoming call.
- Power/Lock Key: Press and hold to turn the device on or off, and to access a device options menu. Press to lock the device, or to wake the screen for unlocking.

# Back



- LED Flash: Use when taking photos or recording video.
- Infrared Sensor: Used to control other external devices.
- Camera lens: Use when taking photos or recording videos.
- Microphones (top and bottom): Capture audio during recording, during phone calls, and video chat.
- **3.5mm Headset Jack**: Plug in an optional headset or TTY equipment.
- External Speaker allows you to hear ringers, music, and other sounds offered by your phone.
- USB Charging/Accessory Port: Connect a USB cable for charging or to sync music and files, or connect to optional accessories (not included).

## **Google Search Bar**

The Google Search Bar provides you an on-screen Internet search engine powered by  $Google^{TM}$ .

- From the main Home screen, tap the Google Search bar Google g.
- 2. Use the on-screen keypad to enter the word(s) in which to search, then tap **Q**.
- **3.** Tap  $\bigcup$  to use Google Voice Search. Follow the on-screen instructions.

# **Home Screen**

The Home screen is the starting point for using your device.



- Status Bar: Presents icons to show network status, battery power, and connection details. For a list of icons, see "Status Bar" on page 35.
- Shortcuts: Shortcuts to apps. These shortcuts are found on the Home screen by default, and you can add more shortcuts to your favorite apps. For more information, see "Shortcuts" on page 38.
- Widgets: Apps that run on the Home screen. These widgets are found on the Home screen by default, and you can add your favorites. For more information, see "Widgets" on page 38.

Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the device unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your device and any changes to the device's Settings.

### **Extended Home Screen**

The Home screen consists of the Home panel, plus panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space for adding shortcuts, widgets and folders.

Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the indicator at the bottom of the display shows your current position.

### **Customizing the Home Screen**

### Adding and removing Home screen panels

Your device comes with 6 Home screen panels. You can customize the Home screen to include up to the seven default panels.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Edit page.
- 2. Slide your finger across the screen to scroll the panels, and use these controls to configure panels:
  - **Remove**: Touch and hold on a panel, then drag it to **Remove**.
  - Add: Touch a previously-removed panel to add it, up to the default total of seven.
  - Set as Home: The panel set as Home will display when you press the **Home Key**.

Tip: You can also "pinch" the Home screen to display Edit options.

# **Menu Navigation**

Navigate your device's features using the command keys and the touch screen.

Warning! Please note that a touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger or a nonmetallic stylus. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. ## **Context-sensitive Menus**

While using your device, context-sensitive menus offer options for the feature or screen.

### To access context-sensitive menus:

- Touch 🔲 Menu.
- Touch and hold on an item.

## **Command Keys**

### Menu Key

Press Press Menu to display a context-sensitive menu of options for the current screen or feature.

### **Home Key**

Press **Home** to display the main Home screen. Press and hold to display recently used apps and access the Task manager.

## **Back Key**

Press **S** Back to return to the previous screen, option or step.

## **Finger Gestures**

### Touch

Touch items to select or launch them. For example:

- Touch the onscreen keyboard to enter characters or text.
- Touch an item to select it.
- Touch an app's icon to launch the application.

### **Touch and Hold**

Activate items by a touch and hold gesture. For example:

- Touch and hold a widget on the Home screen to move it.
- Touch and hold on a field to display a pop-up menu of options.

## **Swipe and Palm Swipe**

Swipe your hand across the screen. For example:

- Unlocking the screen
- · Scrolling the Home screen or a menu
- Combine touch and hold with swipe to drag an item.

Palm swipe by swiping the side of your hand horizontally across the screen. Use palm swipe for:

• Palm swipe to capture: When this setting is On, swiping the screen with the side of your hand (left to right, or right to left) captures a screen shot.

 Palm touch to mute/pause: When this setting is On, covering the screen with your hand mutes or pauses media playback.

### Pan

Touch and hold on the screen, then move the device in a side-to-side motion.

- Pan to move icon: When this setting is On, moving the device in a panning motion (side-to-side) moves a highlighted icon to a new location on the Home screen.
- Pan to browse images: When this setting is 0n, moving the device in a panning motion while viewing an image moves focus around in the image.

## **Pinch and Spread**

Using two fingers, make a pinch or spread motion on the screen. For example:

- Pinch in to zoom in on pictures or screens.
- Spread out your fingers to zoom out on pictures or screens.

### **Hand Gestures**

Your device recognizes motion, to allow you to navigate and access features by moving the device in specific gestures.

To use gestures, enable the Motion settings. For more information, see *"Motions and Gestures"* on page 161.

#### **Pick Up or Turn Over**

Lift the device, or place the device screen-down, on a flat, horizontal surface. For example, to:

• Mute incoming calls and playing sounds.

## **Using Motions and Gestures**

By activating the various motion and gesture features, you can access a variety of time saving functions.

Caution! Excessive shaking or impact to the device may cause unintended results. To learn how to properly control motions, tap Apps → Settings → My device → Motions and gestures. When tapped, each entry displays an on-screen tutorial.

- Air gesture: Control your phone by performing motions above the sensor (without touching the device).
  - Quick glance: When enabled, reach toward the device with the screen off to view important information.
  - Air jump: When enabled, scroll web pages in screen size jumps.
  - Air browse: When enabled, you can move between pictures, pages, or music tracks.
  - Air move: When enabled, you can move app shortcuts or Calendar events.
  - Air call-accept: When enabled, wave your hand over the screen to answer incoming calls.

- Motion: Control your phone using natural movements (on the screen).
  - Direct call: When enabled, lift the device to your ear while viewing a contact to call that contact.
  - Smart alert: When enabled, lift the phone to receive notifications of missed calls or missed notifications while the device was stationary.
  - Zoom: When enabled, tilt the phone to zoom in or out while viewing pictures from the Gallery.
  - Browse an image: When enabled, move the phone from sideto-side to pan from side to side while viewing an image.
  - Mute/pause: When enabled, turn the phone face down to mute incoming calls and pause playback.
- Palm motion: Control your phone by touching the screen with your entire hand.
  - Capture screen: When enabled, swipe the side of your hand across the screen to screen capture and save a copy to the clipboard.
  - Mute/pause: When enabled, cover the screen with your hand to mute incoming calls and pause playback.
- Gyroscope calibration: Calibrate your phone's touch screen.

## **Activate Air Gesture**

- From the Home screen, press Menu and then tap Settings → Settings → My device → Motions and gestures → Air gesture.
- 2. Tap the ON/OFF slider located to the right of Air gesture to turn it ON
- 3. Read the on-screen notification and tap OK.

Note: At least one feature must be activated before Air gesture can be activated.

- 4. Tap Learn about sensor and icon field to review on-screen information about the Air gestures sensor and related icon.
- 5. Tap the ON/OFF slider located to the right of each feature to turn it on .

## **Activate Motion**

1. From the Home screen, press 🔲 Menu and then tap

- 2. Tap the ON/OFF slider located to the right of Motion to turn it on .
- 3. Read the on-screen notification and tap OK.

Note: At least one feature must be activated before Motion can be activated.

 Tap the ON/OFF slider located to the right of each feature to turn it on \_\_\_\_\_\_.

## **Activate Palm Motion**

- 2. In a single motion touch and slide the **Palm motion** slider to the right to turn it on.
- 3. Read the on-screen notification and tap OK.

Note: At least one feature must be activated before you can activate Palm motion.

4. Tap the ON/OFF slider located to the right of each feature to turn it on \_\_\_\_\_.

## Lock and Unlock the Phone

To unlock your phone:

- 1. Press the lock button () located on the upper right side of your phone.
- 2. The lock screen displays with Swipe screen to unlock displayed at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. Swipe the touch screen in any direction.
- 4. The Home screen displays.
- Note: There are several additional ways you can lock your screen. For more information, refer to "Screen lock" on page 144.

## **Smart Screen**

With Smart screen activated your phone automatically adjusts screen time-out, rotation when it detects you are looking at the screen, and controls scrolling and playback when you are facing the screen.

Smart screen features include:

- Smart stay: The screen does not time out as long as you are looking at it.
- Smart rotation: The screen automatically updates to match the angle at which you are viewing the screen.
- Smart pause: The screen automatically pauses video playback if you look away from the screen.
- Smart scroll: The screen scrolls according to the tilt of the phone and your face.

Smart screen uses the front camera to detect when you are facing the screen. Some factors may affect the ability of the front camera to detect your face:

- When the phone is not docked or held upright. For example, when placed on a table.
- When the front camera cannot detect your face and eyes.
- When the front camera is used for the current application.

• When the light source is behind you, or when using the phone in the dark.

## **Configure Smart Screen**

To enable Smart screen features:

 Press ⊨ Menu → Settings → Mu device → Smart screen. For more information, refer to "Smart Screen" on page 164.

# **Air View**

Air view allows you to hover your finger over items on the screen to display more information.

- Information preview: Hover over items to display information previews, extended text, or enlarged images, depending on the type of item.
- **Progress preview**: Hover over a progress bar, such as for video playback, to display a scene preview or elapsed playback time.
- Speed dial preview: Hover over a speed dial to display the name of the contact assigned to the speed dial.
- Webpage magnifier: Hover over a webpage to magnify the content under your finger.

For more detailed information and Air view settings, see "Air view" on page 164.

# **Voice Control**

Use voice commands to control and interact with the phone:

- Incoming calls: When enabled, use the voice commands Answer or Reject to answer or reject calls. When you answer, the Speaker automatically turns on for hands-free conversation.
- Alarm: When enabled, say Stop or Snooze to stop or snooze an alarm.
- Camera: When enabled, say Smile, Cheese, Capture, and Shoot to take pictures.
- Music: When enabled, say Next, Previous, Play, Volume Up, and Volume Down to control the music player.

# **Multi Window Feature**

This feature allows you to run multiple applications on the current screen at the same time.

Note: Only applications found within the Multi window panel can be active atop another current application on the screen.

When launching applications that contain multimedia files (music/video), audio from both files will be played simultaneously.

Multi Window allows you to use multiple apps on the same screen, in multiple, re-sizable windows.

## **Enable Multi Window**

### From Settings

- Press Menu → Settings → My device → Display.
- 2. Tap the check box beside Multi window to enable or disable the feature.

#### **From Notifications**

- 1. Sweep your finger down from the top of the screen to display Notifications.
- 2. Scroll the settings at the top of Notifications, then touch **Multi window** to enable it.

#### **Use the Back Key**

 Press and hold the Sack key to hide the Multi Window tab.

# **Use Multi Window to Launch Multiple Apps**

After enabling Multi Window you can launch applications from Multi Window, or drag an application to the screen to run multiple applications at the same time.

When two applications are running, they display on a split screen. You can switch between the applications or adjust their size on the display.

 While using one application, touch the Multi window tab, then touch and drag a second application to the screen.

# Adjust the Size of Apps in Multi Window

To adjust the size of the two applications on the screen:

 Touch and drag the border between the windows up or down.

# Switch Multi Window App Positions

You can switch the position of the app windows on the screen.

 Touch the border between the two windows, then touch for .

# Make a Multi Window App Full Screen

You can expand an app to full screen anytime.

Touch the border between the windows, then touch .

# Move the Multi Window Tab

When Multi window is enabled, its tab displays on the edge of the screen where it's docked. You can move the Multi window tab up or down on the edge of the screen.

Touch and hold on the  $\begin{vmatrix} y \\ y \end{vmatrix}$  tab, then drag it up or down along the edge of the screen.

Note: This is a quick way to get the tab out of the way if you can't get to a button or option behind it.

# **Repositioning the Multi Window**

The Multi window contains two components: the tab and the applications panel. You can move the tab to other locations and lock it onto any of the four sides of the screen (top/bottom/left/right).

#### To move the tab

- Press and hold the Sack key. The Multi window tab displays on the left side of the screen.
- 2. Tap the tab to display the apps panel (containing the scrollable apps).

# **Notifications**

Notifications shows information about connections, alerts and other items.

- 1. Touch and drag downward from the top of the screen to display notifications.
- 2. Touch an item to open the item, or to launch the related app or feature.

# World Clock

While displaying Notifications, touch the time in the Status bar to display a World clock. Add cities to the clock to display the time in different zones around the world.

# **Clearing Notifications**

- 1. Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen to display Notifications.
- 2. Touch a notification to clear it, or touch **Clear** to clear all notifications.

## **Settings**

Use settings at the top of Notifications to control popular settings. Slide your finger right and left to see all the icons.

- Bluetooth: Turn Bluetooth On or Off. See "Turning Bluetooth On or Off" on page 120.
- GPS: Turn Standalone GPS services on or off. See "Standalone GPS services" on page 169.
- **Sound**: Switch between your sound settings, Mute (all sounds silenced) and Vibrate (all sounds replaced by vibration).
- Smart stay: The phone automatically adjusts screen timeout, rotation when it detects you are looking at the screen, and controls scrolling and playback when you are facing the screen. See "Smart Screen" on page 29.
- Screen rotation: Enable or disable the Auto rotation setting, to control whether the screen automatically updates when you rotate the device. See "Display Settings" on page 147.
- Airplane mode: Turn Airplane mode On or Off. See "Airplane mode" on page 129.
- **Power saving**: Enable or disable Power saving mode. See "Power saving mode" on page 153.

- Driving mode: Enable or disable Driving mode, to have incoming caller ID and text messages read out. See "Text-to-speech options" on page 161.
- Screen Mirroring: Share your device's screen with another device, using an optional AllShare Cast accessory (not included). See "Screen Mirroring" on page 143.
- Multi window: Multi Window allows you to use multiple apps on the same screen, in multiple, resizable windows. See "Multi Window Feature" on page 30.
- Mobile data: Activate or deactivate your device's access to mobile data service. See "Mobile networks" on page 136.
- S Beam: S Beam uses your phone's NFC (Near Field Communication) to send, or "beam", content to other NFC and Wi-Fi Direct devices, by holding the devices close together. See "S Beam" on page 141.
- NFC: Use NFC (Near Field Communication) to share information between your phone and another NFC device by touching the devices together, typically back-to-back. See "NFC" on page 140.
- Air view: Hover your finger over the screen to display information or details. See "Air view" on page 164.

- Sync: When enabled, this feature synchronizes accounts and data.
- Smart scroll: When enabled, the phone scrolls the screen display according to the tilt of the phone and your face position. See "Smart Screen" on page 29.

# **Popup Video**

Multitask with Popup Video - transform your video player into a popup window floating on the screen. The video will continue to play, and the popup window can be resized or moved anywhere on the screen.

## To use Popup Video:

While watching a video, touch the Popup Video icon in the lower right corner of the screen.

# **LED** Indicator

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The LED indicator, on the front of the device above the screen (see "Front" on page 18) animates or glows to show alerts or device status.

- Pulses in multi-color blue while the device is turning On or Off.
  - Blinks blue for a missed call, message or other notification.
  - Glows red when the device is connected to a charger and charging.
    - Blinks red when the device is connected to a charger and there is a problem with charging.
    - Blinks red when battery power is low (device not connected to charger)
- Green Glows green when the device is connected to a charger and the battery is fully charged.

# **Status Bar**

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The Status Bar shows network and battery status and other details, including these common icons.

- X Airplane Mode Active: All wireless communications are disabled. See "Airplane mode" on page 129.
- USB Connected: The device is connected to a ψ computer using a USB cable. For more information about transferring data between your device and a computer, see "Transferring Data" on page 125.
- Voice Call: A voice call is in progress. ٤.
  - Speakerphone: Speakerphone is enabled.
    - Call Muted: A call was muted.
- X **Missed Call:** Displays when there is a missed call.
- $\mathbb{A}$ Mute: Voice or playback volume is muted.
  - Battery Level: Shown fully charged.
- 5 Battery Charging: Battery is charging.

- Device Power Critical: Battery has very little power remaining. Charge immediately.
- GPS E911 Only: E911 location is active (cannot be turned off). See "E911" on page 168.
  - GPS Location Active: One or more GPS location services are active. See "Location services" on page 167.
- Missing SIM: No SIM is installed.

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- No Network: No wireless network is available.
- 4G ITE Connection: device is active on a 4G ITE UG8 system. The arrows are colored when data is being transferred.
  - Signal Strength: Current signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.
- Signal Strength Roaming, Open: Current signal R strength, when the device is roaming. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.

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Signal Strength Roaming, CDMA: Current signal strength, when the device is roaming on CDMA networks. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.

**Wi-Fi Active**: Wi-Fi is active, and connected to a Wi-Fi network. The greater the number of rays, the stronger the signal. The arrows are colored when data is being transferred. For more information about configuring Wi-Fi, see "*Wi-Fi*" on page 130.

**Wi-Fi Action Needed:** Action needed to connect to Wi-Fi network. For more information about configuring Wi-Fi, see *"Wi-Fi"* on page 130.

**Bluetooth Active**: Bluetooth is turned on. For more information, see *"Turning Bluetooth On or Off"* on page 134.

**Bluetooth Paired**: Your device is paired with another Bluetooth device. For more information, see *"Pairing with a Bluetooth Device"* on page 120.

- New Message: You have new message(s).
- New Voicemail: You have new voicemail. A number indicates the number of new messages.
- New Email Message: You have new email.
  - Download Successful: A file was downloaded successfully.
  - Upload Successful: A file was uploaded successfully.
    - **Update Available**: An update is available for an installed app.
    - Update Successful: An update was installed for an app.
- Alarm: An alarm is set.

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- Driving mode: The phone is set to Driving mode.
  - **Silent mode**: All sounds except media and alarms are silenced, and Vibrate is not active.
- Vibrate: Vibrate Silent mode is active.

- Music Playing: Music is playing, but the app is in the background. You can control playback from Notifications, or from Music player.
- Music Paused: Music playback is paused. You can control playback from Notifications, or from Music player.

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**SD Card Ready:** A memory card scan is underway, to prepare the card for use. For more information about using memory cards, see *"Memory Card"* on page 126.

# **Primary Shortcuts**

Primary Shortcuts appear at the bottom of the display. You can edit the Primary Shortcuts, except for **Apps**.

# **Editing the Primary Shortcuts**

#### To add or remove shortcuts:

 Touch and hold a shortcut, then drag it from the Primary Shortcuts to the Home screen, or from the Home screen to the Primary Shortcuts.

#### To remove shortcuts:

Touch and hold the shortcut until **Remove** appears, then drag the shortcut to the **Remove** icon.

# Widgets

Widgets are self-contained applications that you can place on the Home screen for quick access.

# Adding Widgets to the Home screen

#### Adding widgets from the Home screen

- Navigate to a Home screen panel, then touch and hold on the screen to display the Home screen menu.
- 2. Touch Apps and widgets.
- Touch the Widgets tab, then touch and hold and drag it to the Home screen.

# Wallpaper

Choose a picture to display in the background of the Home screen. You can choose pre-loaded wallpaper images, or select a picture you've taken with Camera or downloaded.

Note: You can also set Wallpaper in Settings. For more information, see "Wallpaper" on page 148.

- From the Home screen, touch and hold on the screen to display the Home screen menu, then select Set wallpaper.
- 2. Choose Home screen, Lock screen, or Home and lock screens.
- 3. Choose a source:
  - Gallery: Choose a picture stored on your device or on an optional installed memory card. Touch a picture to select it, then use the crop tool to resize the picture, if desired. Touch Done to set the picture as wallpaper.
  - Live wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded interactive moving wallpapers. Touch a wallpaper, then touch Set wallpaper.
  - Wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch **Set wallpaper**.

• **Travel wallpaper**: When enabled, displays travel recommendations on the Lock screen.

Important! Additional charges may apply for Travel wallpaper. For more information contact your Customer Service representative.

# Apps

Apps holds all applications installed on your device. Applications that you download and install are also added to Apps.

The Apps screen is like the Home screen, it consists of panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space. Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the indicator at the bottom of the display shows your current position.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **Apps**.
- 2. Slide your finger left or right to scroll the Apps screens.
- **3.** Touch an icon to launch the application.

# **Entering Text**

Your device uses a virtual QWERTY keyboard for text entry. Use the keyboard to enter letters, punctuation, numbers, and other characters into text entry fields or applications. Access the keyboard by touching any text entry field.

You can also use voice input to speak your inputs.

The virtual QWERTY keyboard displays at the bottom of the screen. By default, when you rotate the device, the screen orientation updates to display the keyboard at the bottom of the screen.

## **Text Input Methods**

Your device offers three text input methods: Google voice typing, Samsung keyboard, and Swype.

You can set a default text entry method in Settings. For more information, see *"Language and input"* on page 156.

To choose a text input method at any time:

 While entering text, touch and drag downward from the top of the screen to display Notifications, then touch Select input method.

# **Using Samsung Keyboard**

The Samsung keyboard is a custom virtual QWERTY keyboard, featuring optional predictive text. Input characters by tapping the on-screen keys with your finger, or use speech recognition.

You can enable predictive text, to have the Samsung keyboard match your key touches to common words and displays them. Select a word from the display to insert it into your text.

#### **Configuring Samsung keyboard**

#### **Entering Symbols and Numbers**

To enter common symbols, touch symbol to switch to symbol mode, then touch the corresponding key.

To enter less-common symbols, touch  $\texttt{Sym} \rightarrow \texttt{1/2}$  , then touch the corresponding key.

To enter numbers, touch sym , then touch the number keys.

When using Predictive text, you can have next-letter prediction and regional error correction, which compensates for pressing the wrong keys on the QWERTY keyboard.

# **Using Google Voice Typing**

Use your voice to enter text using the Google Voice typing feature.

- 2. At the **Speak now** prompt, speak your text. As you speak, the text displays in the text field.

# Entering Text using Swype

Swype<sup>™</sup> is a new way to enter text on touch screens. Instead of touching each key individually, use your finger to trace over the letters of a word. For each word, place your finger on the first letter and glide to the subsequent letters, lifting on the last letter.

While entering text, touch and drag downward from the top of the screen to display Notifications, then touch Select input method  $\rightarrow$  Swype.

# Accounts

Your device provides the ability to synchronize information, from a variety of accounts, including Email, Facebook, Google, and your Samsung account. Depending on the account, you can choose to synchronize your calendar, contacts, and other types of content.

Contacts from your accounts appear in your device's Contacts.

With synchronization, you can ensure that information on your device is updated with any information that changes in your accounts.

- Touch Add another field to add more fields, including Phonetic Name, Organization, Email, IM, Address, Notes, Nickname, Website, Events, or Relationship.
- 4. Touch Save when you finish entering information.

## **Joining Contacts**

Your device can synchronize with multiple accounts, including Google, Corporate, and other providers, plus social networking sites like Facebook. When you synchronize contacts from these accounts with your device, you may have multiple contacts for one person.

Joining contact records allows you to see all the contact's numbers and addresses together. Joining also helps you keep your contacts updated, because any changes to information in the respective accounts is automatically updated the next time you synchronize with the account.

# Making Calls Using the Phone Keypad

# Making Calls using Speed Dials

Speed Dials are 1-, 2-, or 3-digit shortcuts (1 to 100) you assign to contacts, to allow you to quickly call the contact.

- Touch the digits of the speed dial number on the Keypad, holding the last digit until the number dials.

- Touch For Menu for options:
  - Contacts: Launch Contacts.
  - Memo: Launch S Memo.
  - Message: Launch Messaging.

 Auto reject list: Enter telephone numbers to reject. Turn on Unknown number to reject calls with no caller ID. Touch Create, then follow the prompts to enter numbers to reject, or select them from Contacts. Touch Match criteria to set options for using the reject number list.

## **Outgoing calls**

- Auto reject mode: Sets Auto reject mode for outgoing calls to Off, All numbers, or Auto reject numbers.
- Auto reject list: Create and manager numbers for the auto reject list.

Create and manage text messages to send to callers when rejecting incoming calls. Messages you create here are available from the incoming call screen when you use the Reject with message option.

## Answering/ending calls

Manage settings for answering and ending calls.

  - Voice control: When enabled, you can answer an incoming call using a voice command.

## Turn off screen during calls

When enabled, the screen automatically turns off during phone calls, and the proximity sensor on the front of the device is used to turn the screen back on when the device is moved or brought close to another surface, such as when you move the device to your ear.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **N** Phone.
- 2. Touch  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Call Settings.
- 3. Touch Turn off screen off during calls to enable or disable the screen during calls.

#### **Call alerts**

Set options for sounds and vibrations to occur during calls.

#### **Call vibrations**

- Vibrate on connection to network: the device vibrates when it connects to the network.
- **Call-end vibration** the device vibrates when the other caller ends the call.

## **Call status tones**

Choose options for sounds to play during calls

- Call connect tone The device plays a tone when the other caller answers a call.
- Minute minder A tone plays once per minute during a call.
- **Call end tone** The device plays a tone when the other caller ends the call. Touch **OK** to save the settings.

## Alerts on call

Sets call alerts.

 Alerts on call: When enabled, notifications play during phone calls for alarms and new messages. When disabled, these notifications are muted during a call.

## **Call accessories**

Configure headset options for calls.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🤇 Phone.
- 2. Touch  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Call Settings  $\rightarrow$  Call accessories.
- 3. Configure settings:
  - Automatic answering: When enabled, and you have a headset connected to the Headset Jack, incoming calls are answered automatically after a delay, set at Automatic answering timer.
  - Automatic answering timer: Choose a time period to delay before automatically answering an incoming call when Automatic answering is enabled and a headset is connected to the device.
  - **Outgoing call conditions**: When the device is paired with a Bluetooth headset, you can choose to make calls even when the device is locked.

## **Call forwarding**

Configures the Call forwarding options.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🔍 Phone.
- 3. Configure settings:
  - Activate call forwarding: Enables the Call forwarding feature.
  - **Deactivate Call Forwarding**: Disables the Call forwarding feature.

## **Ringtones and keypad tones**

Choose tones and/or vibration to play for incoming calls and keypad touches.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch 🤍 Phone.
- 3. Configure settings:
  - **Ringtones**: Choose a default ringtone for incoming calls.
  - Vibrations: Choose a vibration pattern, or create your own pattern, to play for incoming calls when Incoming call vibration is turned On. Vibration plays along with the ringtone, if Silent mode is not enabled.

- Vibrate when ringing: When enabled, the Device vibration plays for incoming calls.
- **Keypad tones**: When enabled, sounds play when you touch the Phone keypad.

## Personalize call sound

Choose options for call audio, in cases where you might need the sound softer or more clear, or optimized for your right or left ear. These are the defaults, but you can change them during a call by touching  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  My call sound.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **[Vert** Phone.
- 3. Configure options:
  - Adapt Sound: Automatically adapts the sound output quality during a call.
  - **Soft sound**: Decreases the call sound volume so it sounds softer during a call.
  - Clear sound: Increases the call sound volume so the sound is more clear during a call.
  - Off: Disables the personalization option.

#### Noise reduction

When enabled, the phone suppresses background noise from the side during calls.

- **1.** From the Home screen, touch **Q** Phone.
- 2. Touch  $\blacksquare$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Call Settings  $\rightarrow$  Noise reduction.

#### Increase volume in pocket

When enabled, the device uses the proximity sensor to detect when the device is in a pocket or other close-fitting location such as a purse or bag, and increases the volume for incoming call ringtones.

## Voicemail

Configure options for voicemail.

  - Voicemail service: By default, your device uses your wireless service provider's voicemail service. If you have another option for voicemail installed, select it here.
  - Voicemail settings: By default, the speed dial for calling voicemail for your service provider is \*86 (\*VM). If you wish to use another speed dial, touch Voicemail number to set a new one.
  - Sound: Choose a Default ringtone.
  - Vibrate: Choose an option for vibration to play for a voicemail notification.

#### **Other call settings**

1. From the Home screen, touch **[New Phone**.



- 2. Touch  $\square$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Call Settings.
- 3. Configure options:
  - Current country: Choose the country you are in. This is used in Assisted dialing.
  - Assisted dialing: When turned On, your phone automatically dials appropriate codes and prefixes for international calls. Touch to turn the option On or Off, then touch Assisted dialing to configure settings.
  - Auto retry: When enabled, the device will automatically redial a call if it receives a busy signal from the network.
  - TTY mode: Choose a TTY mode to enable TTY mode, for use with optional TTY equipment.
  - DTMF tones: Set the length of Dual-tone Multi-frequency tones, which play when you use the keypad during a call, such as when navigating device menus.
  - · Voice privacy: Enable or disable Enhanced voice privacy, to improve the security of phone calls.

## **Section 5: Messaging**

## **Types of Messages**

Your device supports these types of messages:

- Text messages: Send and receive simple messages containing text to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as SMS).
- Multimedia messages: Send and receive text messages with pictures, video, and/or sound to other mobile phones or email addresses (also known as MMS).
- Mobile IMs: Exchange Instant Messages with other users of popular messaging sites.
- Email: Send and receive email from your email accounts, including Corporate mail.
- Gmail: Send and receive Gmail from your Google account.
- Voicemail: Retrieve voice messages from callers.
- Google Talk: Chat with other Google Talk users.

Note: Messaging service availability depends on your network and service plan. Multimedia Messaging charges apply per your Calling Plan. Monthly plans are available. Higher rates apply for International Multimedia Messaging (when available). Compatible Device required. Consult Verizon Wireless for more information.

## **Text and Multimedia Messaging**

Your device can send and receive text and multimedia messages.

### **Creating and Sending Messages**

- 1. From the Home screen, touch <del>-</del> Messaging.
- 2. Touch 🗹 Compose.
- 3. Touch Enter recipient and enter a name, phone number or email address, or touch 1 to add recipients from Contacts. As you enter text, matching contacts appear. Touch a contact to add it to the list.
- Touch Enter message, then enter the message. While entering the message, use these options (available options depend on attachment):
  - Touch Attach to add media or content to the message (converts the message to MMS).
  - Touch 🔲 Menu for options:
    - Insert smiley: Add a text emoticon to the message.
    - Add text: Select text from S Memo, Calendar, Contacts or Text templates to add.
    - View contact: Displays the contacts information profile.

- Add to Contacts: If the recipients are not saved in Contacts, save the info as a new contact, or update an existing contact.
- Add slide/Remove slide: Add or remove a slide. Slides hold pictures or other media, and adding a slide converts the message to MMS.
- Add subject: Add a subject field (converts the message to MMS.)
- Priority level: Set the urgency of the message.
- Discard: Erase the message without sending it.
- Translate: Launches S Translator to translate text to or from another language.
- 5. Review the message and tap Send.

#### **Message Threads**

Sent and received text and picture messages are grouped into message threads. Threaded messages allow you to see all the messages exchanged (similar to a chat program) and displays a contact on the screen. Message threads are listed in the order in which they were received, with the latest message displayed at the top.

To open a threaded message follow these steps:

- From the main Home screen, tap Messaging. Tap the message thread you want to view.
- 2. Touch and hold the message thread to display the following options:
  - Add to Contacts: adds the contact listed in this message to the Contact list.
  - View contact: displays the contact's information. This option only displays if the sender is in your Contacts list.
  - **Delete thread**: displays a confirmation dialog box that when pressed, deletes the entire thread.
  - Save messages: Saves all messages in this thread.

## **Deleting Messages**

### Deleting a single message thread

- **1.** From the main Home screen, tap  $\frown$  Messaging.
- 2. Touch and hold a message, then tap Delete thread.
- 3. At the **Delete** prompt, tap **OK** to delete or **Cancel** to cancel.

## **Message Options**

### **Options before composing a message**

- 1. From the main Home screen, tap <del>Messaging</del>.
- 2. Before composing a message, press = Menu and select from these options:
  - Search: allows you to search through all of your messages for a certain word or string of words. Enter a search string in the Messaging Search window and tap Q.
  - Delete threads: allows you to delete any message thread.
     Select the messages to delete and a green checkmark displays next to the message. Tap Delete.
  - **Draft messages**: displays the draft messages folder and its contents.
  - Locked messages: displays the locked messages folder and its contents.
    - Messaging 71

- Save messages: displays the saved messages folder and its contents.
- Settings: allows you to access Messaging settings. For more information, refer to "Messaging Settings" on page 73.

### **Options while composing a message**

- While composing a message, press Menu and select from these options:
  - **Insert smiley**: allows you to add emoticons, such as a happy face to your message.
  - Add text: allows you to copy text from your contacts, calendar, or from a memo to add to your message. This is a convenient feature for adding names, phone numbers, events, etc. to your message.
  - Add to Contacts: adds the current contact phone number to the Contacts list (if it is not already listed).
  - View contact: allows you to see information on the recipient. This option only appears if the recipient is in your Contacts list.
  - Add slide: allows you to add a new page to a message.
  - Add subject: adds a subject line to the message.
  - **Priority level**: sets the messages priority level to Normal or High.

- Discard: allows you to delete the message.
- Translate: launches translation where you assign the language in which you are composing, and select a language for the recipient. Other options include, Incoming messages only, and Include original text in outgoing message.

## **Messaging Settings**

To configure the settings for text messages, multimedia messages, Voice mails, and Push messages.

- 1. From the main Home screen, tap  $\longrightarrow$  Messaging  $\rightarrow$   $\square$  Menu  $\rightarrow$  Settings.
- 2. The following Messaging settings are available: General settings
  - Restore messages: restores saved messages to your inbox.
  - Delete old messages: deletes old messages when the limit is reached, rather than having them overwritten.
  - Text message limit: allows you to set a limit on how many text messages can be in one conversation.
  - Multimedia message limit: allows you to set a limit on how many multimedia messages can be in one conversation.
  - Text templates: allows you to edit or add new text templates to use in your messaging.

### Text message (SMS) settings

• **Delivery reports**: when selected, requests a delivery report for each message sent.

• Manage SIM card messages: allows you to manage the messages that you have stored on your SIM card.

#### Multimedia message (MMS) settings

- **Delivery reports**: when selected, requests a delivery report for each message sent.
- Auto-retrieve: allows the message system to retrieve messages automatically.
- Roaming auto-retrieve: automatically retrieves messages while roaming.
- MMS alert: allows you to receive an alert when MMS mode becomes active.
- Group conversations: send messages as group conversations by default.

### Display

- **Bubble style**: allows you to choose from several bubble styles for your messages. Bubbles are the rounded boxes that surround each message.
- **Background style**: allows you to choose from several background styles for your messages.
- Use the volume key: allows you to change the text size by using the up or down volume keys.

#### **Notifications settings**

- Notifications: allows you to see message notifications on your status bar.
- Select ringtone: allows you to set the ringtone for your message notifications.
- Vibrate: allows you to configure the vibration mode associated with message alerts.
- Message alert repetition: allows you to set the interval for new message alerts. Choose from: Once, Every 2 minutes, or Every 10 minutes.

#### Signature settings

- Signature text: allows you to enter a desired signature for your message.

#### **Callback number**

- Enable callback number: enables the number entered for callback.
- **Callback number**: touch to enter a callback number. This field displays the callback number entered.

## **Emergency Alerts**

This device is designed to receive Wireless Emergency Alerts from the Commercial Mobile Alert Service (CMAS). Emergency Alerts are geographically-targeted, and alert customers of imminent threats to their safety within their area. There is no charge for receiving an Emergency Alert. There are three types of Emergency Alerts:

- Presidential
- Imminent (Severe or Extreme)
- AMBER Alerts (missing person alert)

Customers may choose not to receive Imminent Alerts and AMBER Alerts. Presidential Alerts can not be disabled. To disable Imminent Threat Alerts (Extreme and Severe) and AMBER Alerts, follow these instructions:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch <del>Messaging</del>.
- Touch ■ Menu, then touch Settings → Emergency Alerts.
- All alerts (except Emergency alert test messages) are enabled by default (checkmark showing). To disable alerts, touch an alert to remove the checkmark.



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### **Taking Dual Camera Photos**

- Photo size: Select the size of the photo output. Selections are: 4128x3096 (4:3) 13M, 4128x2322 (16:9) W9.4M, 3264x2448 (4:3) 8M, 3264x1836 (16:9) W6M, 2048x1152 (16:9) W2.4M.
- Burst shot: Hold down Capture to take multiple shots; then choose the best shots to keep.
- Face detection: While composing a picture, double-tap on a face to zoom in or out.
- Metering: Select a method for measuring light: Centerweighted, Matrix, or Spot.
- ISO: Choose a setting for imaging sensitivity. Choose from Auto, 100, 200, 400, or 800. Use a lower ISO number to make your camera less sensitive to light, a higher ISO number to take photos with less light, or Auto to let the camera automatically adjust the ISO for each shot.
- Anti-Shake: When enabled, minimizes the effect of camera movement.

- Auto night detection: Automatically detects very low light conditions to take a good photo at night.
- Save as: Delivers images with greater intensity which is effective for reducing overexposure in bright conditions.

#### Camcorder

- Video size: Select the video recording size. Selections: 1920x1080 (16:9), 1440x1080 (4:3), 1280x720 (16:9), 320x240 (4:3).
- Video stabilization: Turn the video stabilization feature On or Off.

#### **More Camera Settings**

- GPS tag: Add GPS location information to photo details.
- Review: Displays each picture after you take it.
- Volume key: Determines which key acts as the Volume key. Selections are: Volume Up/Down key as the zoom key, Camera key, or the Record key.
- **Timer**: Sets a delayed-time shot. Set the timer to Off, 2 sec, 5 sec, or 10sec.
- White balance: Choose a setting for the light source.
- Exposure value: Sets a default brightness level.

- **Guidelines**: Enable or disable an on-screen grid to aid in photo composition.
- Flash: Choose the default flash mode.
- Voice control: Enable or disable voice control commands.
- **Contextual filename**: (Requires GPS tag activation.) When On, the location is included as part of the filename.
- Save as flipped: When On, videos are saved as a mirror-image of the screen display.
- **Storage**: If an optional memory card is installed (not included), choose the default storage location for pictures.
- Reset: Set all Camera settings to the defaults.

#### **Changing the Mode**

- Beauty face: Lightens faces for softer images.

When Gallery opens, tap the yellow frame on each face, and choose the best individual face for the subject. After choosing a pose for each individual, tap Done to merge the images into a single photo, and then tap Save.
- Sound & shot: Enrich pictures by adding background sounds for a few seconds. The background sound is recorded for up to 9 seconds after taking the photo.
- **Drama**: Take a series of photos of a moving object and then merge them together into one image.

- Animated photo: Creates a picture that contains selected moving objects by animating parts of picture.
- Rich tone (HDR): Select when taking photos with richer colors and contrasts.
- Eraser: Saves the best of 5 taken pictures and removes any moving objects in the background, like people walking behind you.
- Panorama: Use this to take wide panoramic photos. Press the Shutter button to take a photo, and then move the camera in any direction. When the blue frame aligns with the preview screen, the camera automatically takes another shot in the panoramic sequence. Press the shutter button again to stop shooting.
- **Sports**: Use to take fast action photos.
- Night: Use this setting for low-light conditions, without using the flash. Press the Shutter button to take multiple photos. Photos are automatically merged into a single photo.



- 6. Tap the (II) Pause key to pause the recording.

**Portrait:** applies various face correction effects such as: Red-eye fix, Airbrush face, Face brightness, Out-of-focus, Beauty face, Face reshape, or Spot healing.



Sticker: places various pre-created on-screen stickers on top the of current image.

**Drawing**: adds a drawing on the picture by using either a brush/pen or eraser.



**Frame**: places a pre-created border style on top of the current image.

# Section 7: Connections

## Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that provides access to local area networks.

Wi-Fi communication requires access to an existing Wi-Fi network. Wi-Fi networks can be Open (unsecured), or Secured (requiring you to provide login credentials).

Your device supports the 802.11 a/b/g/n Wi-Fi protocols.

#### **Configuring Wi-Fi Settings**

Configure your device's Wi-Fi settings. For more information, see "Wi-Fi" on page 130.

### Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

Turn your device's Wi-Fi service on or off. When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your device automatically searches for nearby available Wi-Fi networks.

Tip: You can also turn Wi-Fi On or Off from Settings.

- 1. From the Home screen, sweep your finger downward to display Notifications.
- If Wi-Fi is not already on, touch Wi-Fi Off to turn on Wi-Fi.
  - or –
- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi 🔤 to turn Wi-Fi On or Off.

#### Scanning and Connecting to a Wi-Fi Network

When you turn on Wi-Fi, your device searches for available Wi-Fi connections, then displays them.

- If Wi-Fi is not already on, touch Wi-Fi Off to turn on Wi-Fi.

- On the pop-up Wi-Fi settings screen, touch Add Wi-Fi Network (below the scanned networks), then enter these fields:
  - Network Name (SSID): Enter the name of the Wi-Fi network.
  - Security: Select the type of security used by the Wi-Fi network.
  - Password: If the network is secured, enter the password.
- Touch Connect to save the settings and connect to the network now, or Save to save the network settings for future use.

### **Wi-Fi Direct**

Wi-Fi Direct is a standard that allows devices to connect to each other directly via Wi-Fi, without a Wi-Fi network or hotspot, and without having to set up the connection. This type of connection is commonly called peer-to-peer.

For example, your device can use Wi-Fi Direct to share photos, contacts and other content with other Wi-Fi Direct devices. Many of the apps on your device provide options for sharing via Wi-Fi Direct under **menu**.

## Turning Wi-Fi Direct On or Off

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi and then tap Wi-Fi Direct to turn Wi-Fi Direct On or Off.

### **Connecting to Wi-Fi Direct Devices**

- 3. Enable Wi-Fi Direct on the other device(s). Consult the other device's documentation for more information.

- In the scanned list, touch a device to connect with it, or touch Multi-connect to connect to multiple devices (not all devices support multi-connect).
- **6.** Follow the prompts on both devices to complete the connection.

## **Mobile Hotspot**

Use Mobile Hotspot to share your device's internet connection with a PC or other device through Wi-Fi, using your device as the mobile hotspot.

## Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology for exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet. You don't need to line up the devices to send information with Bluetooth. If the devices are in range, you can exchange information between them, even if they are in different rooms.

Your device can use Bluetooth to share photos, contacts and other content with other Bluetooth devices. Many of the apps on your device provide options for sharing via Bluetooth under **menu**.

### **Configuring Bluetooth Settings**

Configure your device's Bluetooth settings. For more information, see "*Bluetooth*" on page 133.

Note: Bluetooth profiles are specifications for services supported by individual devices. For a list of profiles your device supports, see *"Bluetooth profiles"* on page 133.

### **Turning Bluetooth On or Off**

 From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.

Touch and slide the slider next to Bluetooth turn Bluetooth On or Off.

Tip: You can also turn Bluetooth On or Off on Notifications. From almost any unlocked screen, sweep your finger down from the Status bar to display Notifications.

### Pairing with a Bluetooth Device

Search for a Bluetooth device and pair with it, to exchange information between your device and the target device.

After pairing, your device and the target device will recognize each other and exchange information without a passcode or PIN.

Note: When paired, the set Bluetooth paired icon displays in the Status Bar. If you receive a new request for pairing while paired with a Bluetooth headset, a new Bluetooth icon displays at the left of the Status bar and Notifications displays the pairing request.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- Touch and slide the slider next to Bluetooth turn Bluetooth On or Off.
- 3. Activate the target device's discoverable mode.
- 4. Touch Scan.
- From the list of scanned devices, touch the target device, then follow the prompts to complete the pairing:
  - If the target device requires a PIN, enter a PIN for the target device and touch **OK**. When prompted, enter the PIN on the target device.
  - If the device allows automatic or smart pairing, your device will attempt to pair with the device automatically. Follow the prompts on your device and the target device to complete the pairing.

## VPN

You can use your device's VPN (Virtual Private Network) feature to connect to VPNs.

### **Configuring VPN Settings**

Configure your device's VPN settings. For more information, see "*Nearby devices*" on page 124.

Note: You must enable at least Pattern security before setting up a VPN. If you have not yet enabled security, you'll be prompted to do so the first time you launch VPN settings.

### Adding a VPN

- Touch Basic VPN or Advanced IPsec VPN to set up a connection to a VPN. Available settings depend on the type of VPN selected.

## Tethering

Use Tethering to share your device's internet connection with a computer that connects to your device via USB cable, or by Bluetooth.

Touch **Help** under Tethering settings to view information about tethering, and for links to more information.

Note: Mobile Broadband Connect may require a subscription to Mobile Hotspot/Mobile Broadband Connect service. Contact Verizon Wireless for more information. Mobile Hotspot consumes battery power and uses data service. While the Mobile Hotspot is active, your device's applications will use the Mobile Hotspot data allowance.

### **Mobile Broadband Connect**

Use Mobile Broadband Connect to share your device's network connection with a computer that connects to your device via USB cable.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections → More networks →Tethering.
- 2. Connect the other device to your device via USB cable.

3. Touch Mobile Broadband connect to turn tethering On or Off.

## Bluetooth tethering

Before starting, pair your computer with your device, then configure your computer to obtain its network connection via Bluetooth.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections → More networks →Tethering.
- 2. Connect the other device to your device via USB cable.
- 3. Touch Bluetooth tethering to turn tethering On or Off.

Important! Tethering consumes battery power and increases your data usage. Roaming while using tethering will incur extra data charges.

## **NFC and Beaming**

Use NFC (Near Field Communication) to share information between your device and another NFC device by beaming, typically by touching the devices together back-to-back.

Your device uses NFC for the S Beam feature. NFC must be turned on to use S Beam.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Tap the NFC slider

to turn NFC On or Off.

Note: NFC must be turned on to use S Beam.

## **Android Beam**

When enabled, beam application content to another NFCcapable device by holding the devices close together. You can beam browser pages, YouTube videos, contacts, and more.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections → NFC.
- 2. Touch and slide the slider to the right of NFC to turn it ON

Note: NFC must be turned On to use Android Beam.

3. Touch and slide the Android Beam slider to the right to turn it ON

### S Beam

Share more and share it faster with S Beam. From photos to documents, large video files to maps, you can share almost anything instantly with one touch, simply by placing your devices back-to-back.

S Beam uses your device's NFC (Near Field Communication) feature to send, or "beam", content to other NFC and Wi-Fi Direct devices, by holding the devices close together.

S Beam works in the background. Use the sharing options from your favorite apps to select content to share via S Beam. For example, you can beam pictures or videos from Gallery, or songs from Music player. Just bring the devices together (typically back-to-back), then tap the screen.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Tap the NFC slider with to turn NFC On or Off.
- 3. Touch S Beam, then touch to turn S Beam On or Off.

Tip: When you turn on S Beam, NFC automatically turns on.

## **Nearby devices**

Share files with nearby devices using DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance) standards, over Wi-Fi.

To share with nearby devices, you must connect to a Wi-Fi network. The devices you wish to share files with must also be connected to the same Wi-Fi network and must support DLNA.

Important! Use care when enabling file sharing for nearby devices. When enabled, other devices can access data on your device.

## Turning File sharing On or Off

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections → Nearby devices.
- 2. Touch File sharing to turn sharing On or Off.

#### **Configuring File Sharing**

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections → Nearby devices.
- 2. Under Advanced, touch options to control how content is shared from your device:
  - Shared contents: Choose the type of content to share, from Videos, Photos, or Music.
  - Allowed devices list: View and manage devices allowed to connect to your device.
  - Not-allowed devices list: View and manage devices restricted from connecting to your device.
  - **Download to**: Choose a location to save downloaded content, from USB storage (device memory) or SD card.
  - Upload from other devices: Choose how to handle incoming files from other devices, from Always accept, Always ask, or Always reject.

## **Connecting to a Computer**

Connect your device to a computer to transfer data between your device and the computer. Use the USB cable that comes with your device, or use one of the pre-loaded apps on your device to connect wirelessly.

### **Transferring Data**

Connect your device to a computer, via USB cable, to transfer data as a Media device using MTP (Media Transfer Protocol), or as a Camera using PTP (Photo Transfer Protocol).

- Attach your device to the computer with a USB data cable. Your device recognizes the connection as the last connection method you used, and displays a connection alert in the Status bar and Notifications.
- 2. From the Home screen, sweep your finger downward to display Notifications, then touch the alert.
- 3. Select a connection method:
  - Media device (MTP): Transfer media files with Windows, or using Android file transfer on a Mac (see <u>www.android.com/</u> <u>filetransfer</u>).
  - **Camera (PTP)**: Transfer photos using camera software, and transfer files to computers that do not support MTP.

- On your computer, choose a method for accessing your device. Available options depend on the programs installed on your computer.
- **5.** Transfer files to the memory card. When finished, you can disconnect the USB cable.

#### **Kies** air

Manage content saved on your device via your desktop or mobile browser using Wi-Fi technology. The pre-loaded Kies air app connects via Wi-Fi to the Kies application, which you can install on your computer.

Note: To sync your device to a PC, it is highly recommended that you install Samsung Kies, which is available at <u>http://www.samsung.com/kies</u> (for Windows/Mac). If you are a Windows XP user, ensure that you have Windows XP Service Pack 3 or higher installed on your computer. Also, ensure that you have Samsung Kies 2.0 or Windows Media Player 10 or higher installed on your computer.

## **Memory Card**

Your device supports removable microSD<sup>™</sup> or microSDHC<sup>™</sup> memory cards of up to 64GB capacity, for storage of music, pictures, videos, and other files.

By default, files that you download, or that you create with your device, such as pictures and videos you capture with Camera, are stored to your device's memory. For more storage capacity, you can set the memory card as the primary storage location for apps with the app's options.

### Installing and Removing a Memory Card

Important! To prevent damage to data stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the device.

#### Mounting and Unmounting a Memory Card

Mounting a memory card establishes the connection between your device and the card, to prepare for saving files to the memory card. In most cases, the device mounts the card automatically when you install it, and displays the memory card status on Notifications.

Before removing the card, use the Mount/Unmount setting to unmount, it to prevent damage to data stored on the card.

## **Accessing Settings**

#### From the Home screen

Touch Apps → O Settings, and select a tab. - or -

Press **Menu**; then select **Settings**, and select a tab.

#### **From Notifications**

 Touch and drag downward from the top of the screen to display notifications; then touch \$\$, and select a tab.

## **Settings Tabs**

Settings now display on tabs by category to access options:



**Connections**: Displays all of the connection features such as: Airplane mode, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, Data usage, More networks (Mobile networks, Mobile Hotspot, Tethering, and VPN), NFC, S Beam, Nearby devices, Screen Mirroring, and Kies via Wi-Fi.



My device: Displays Personalization, and Input and control settings such as: Lock screen, Display, LED indicator, Sound, Home screen mode, Call, Power saving mode, Accessory, Accessibility, Language and input, Motions and gestures, Smart screen, Air view, and Voice control.



Accounts: Displays account configuration and management features for Samsung, Email, and Social media accounts such as: Backup Assistant Plus, Add account, and Backup and reset.



**More**: Displays Permissions, and Device manager settings such as: Location services, Security, Application manager, Battery, Storage, Date and time, and About phone.

This section is presented in the same sequence as the settings that display on the tabs.

## Connections Settings Airplane mode

When airplane mode is enabled, all your phone's wireless connections are disabled, and you cannot make or receive calls or messages or connect to networks. While in airplane mode, you can use other features of your phone, such as playing music, watching videos, or other applications.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Airplane mode to enable or disable airplane mode.

Note: Airplane mode can also be controlled from Notifications, and from Device options when you press and hold the O Power/Lock Key.

## Wi-Fi

Set up and manage your phone's connections to Wi-Fi networks. Your phone supports Wi-Fi a/b/g/n.

### Turning Wi-Fi On or Off

Turn your phone's Wi-Fi service on or off. When you turn Wi-Fi service on, your phone automatically searches for available Wi-Fi networks.

Tip: You can also turn Wi-Fi On or Off from Notifications.

From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
 Touch Wi-Fi to turn Wi-Fi On or Off.

## Wi-Fi Settings

Set up and manage wireless access points.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings → then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi.
- 3. On the Wi-Fi screen, touch settings to configure:
  - Notify me: When enabled, your phone notifies you of Wi-Fi networks when you launch a high data-usage application.
  - Auto-connect: When enabled, your phone will automatically connect to known Wi-Fi networks when you launch a high datausage application, even if Wi-Fi is turned off. A known Wi-Fi network is one that you previously added.
  - Add Wi-Fi network: Connect to a new Wi-Fi network. For more information, see "Adding a Wi-Fi Network Manually" on page 116.
  - Scan: Search for available Wi-Fi networks.
  - Wi-Fi Direct: Access Wi-Fi Direct. For more information, see "Wi-Fi Direct" on page 117.

#### **Other Wi-Fi Settings**

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi.
- 3. Touch E Menu for additional settings:
  - Advanced:
    - Passpoint: When turned On, your phone will automatically connect to Passpoint-enabled Wi-fi networks.
    - Keep Wi-Fi on during sleep: Specify when to switch from Wi-Fi to mobile data for data communications, when the phone goes to sleep (when the backlight goes out). This setting can affect your data usage, and the behavior of devices you connect to your phone, such as when tethering or using Mobile Hotspot.
    - Check for Internet service: When enabled, your device will check to see if Internet service is available, when connected to a Wi-Fi Access Point (AP).

- MAC address: (Not configurable) View your phone's MAC address, needed for connecting to some secured networks.
- IP address: (Not configurable) View your phone's IP address.
- Manage networks: View and manage your saved Wi-Fi networks. Touch a network to connect to it, or to forget or modify its settings.
- WPS push button: Set up a connection to a WPS (Wi-Fi Protected Setup) router or equipment.
- WPS PIN entry: View the PIN used by your device to set up a PIN-secured connection to a Wi-Fi router.
- Help: Provides instructions on how to connect to a Wi-Fi network.

### Passpoint

Wi-Fi Certified Passpoint<sup>™</sup> automatically connects to a Passpoint-enabled Wi-Fi network.

- 2. Touch Wi-Fi.
- Touch Passpoint to connect to a compatible access point.
- 5. Touch and slide the Passpoint slider to the right to turn it ON

### Wi-Fi Direct

Wi-Fi Direct allows devices to connect to each other directly via Wi-Fi, without a Wi-Fi network or hotspot, and without having to set up the connection. For example, your phone can use Wi-Fi Direct to share photos, contacts and other content with other Wi-Fi Direct devices. For more information, see *"Wi-Fi Direct"* on page 117.

#### **Turning Wi-Fi Direct On or Off**

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch Connections.
- 2. Touch Wi-Fi.
- Touch Wi-Fi Direct at the bottom of the screen. Your device automatically scans for nearby Wi-Fi Direct devices, or you can touch Scan to start scanning.
- After scanning for devices, touch a device to connect to it; then follow the prompts to complete the connection.

Touch **Multi-connect** to create a connection to devices that support multi-connect. Touch **Scan** to search for available multi-connect devices; then touch the devices you want to connect to, and follow the prompts to complete the connection.

Bluetooth profiles are specifications for services supported by individual devices. Profiles improve the ability of different devices to work together. Your phone supports these Bluetooth profiles:

- Headset: HSP v1.2 profile supports use of compatible Bluetooth headsets for mono voice.
- Handsfree: HFP v1.5 profile supports Bluetooth headsets, and may also support other compatible Bluetooth devices with speakerphone capabilities.
- Stereo: A2DP v1.2, AVRCP v1.0, GAVDP 1.2, AVCTP 1.3 and AVDTP 1.2 profiles support delivery of stereo audio to compatible Bluetooth devices.
- Object Exchange: OPP v1.0 profile allows sending and receiving of contact name cards (vCard 2.1) and calendar events (vCalendar) between devices. PBAP v1.2 supports exchange of Phone Book Objects.

- Human Interface Devices: HID v1.0 profile supports certain interface devices.
- Personal Area Networking: PAN 1.0 supports exchange of data with other devices.
- Message Access Profile: MAP 1.0 allows exchange of text messages between devices, such as with an automotive handsfree device.
- Health Device Profile: HDP allows communication with medical devices.



#### Data usage

 Data usage cycle: Use the drop-down menu to select a range of dates.

#### **Data usage options**

## Connect and share NFC

## S Beam

S Beam uses your phone's NFC (Near Field Communication) to send, or "beam", content to other NFC and Wi-Fi Direct devices, by holding the devices close together.

S Beam works in the background. Use the sharing options from your favorite apps to select content to share via S Beam. For example, you can beam pictures, videos, or songs. Just bring the devices together (typically back to back), and tap the screen.

  - Upload from other devices: Choose how to handle incoming files from other devices, from Always accept, Always ask, or Always reject.

### Screen lock

  - Face unlock: When enabled, you unlock the phone by looking at the screen. This option offers low security, because someone who looks similar to you could unlock your phone. Touch the option for more information, and set up Face unlock.

- Face and voice: When enabled, you unlock the phone by looking at the screen and speaking. This option offers low security, because someone who looks and/or sounds similar to you could unlock your phone. Touch the option for more information, and to set up Face and voice.
- Pattern: When enabled, you draw a pattern, which you create, on the screen to unlock the phone. Touch the option; then follow the prompts to create or change your screen unlock pattern.
- **PIN**: When enabled, you enter a numeric PIN (Personal Identification Number), which you create, to unlock the phone.
- **Password**: When enabled, you enter an alphanumeric password, which you create, to unlock the phone.
- None: Disable all custom screen lock settings, to use the default swipe unlock screen.

#### **Swipe options**

- Multiple widgets displays multiple widgets on your lock screen.
- Lock screen widgets locks the widgets displayed on the home screens.
- Shortcuts sets shortcuts that display at the bottom of the Lock screen. Touch and slide the slider to the right to turn it
- Unlock effect sets the type of effect to view when unlocking the phone. Select None, Ripple effect, or Light effect.
- Help text shows help information on the Lock screen.
- Wake up in lock screen requires that you say a command to wake-up your phone.
- Set wake-up command designates your wake-up commands. Tap Set wake-up command and follow the on-screen prompts to create a new verbal command.

#### Face / Face and Voice unlock options

Important! Do not use face unlock while driving.

- Lock screen widgets locks the widgets displayed on the home screens.
- Make pattern visible: displays the pattern as you draw it.
- Lock automatically: The screen automatically locks a defined period of time after the screen turns off.
- Lock instantly with power key: press the power key to instantly lock the phone.

### Secured with PIN

- Lock screen widgets locks the widgets displayed on the home screens.
- Lock automatically: The screen automatically locks a defined period of time after the screen turns off.
- Lock instantly with power key: press the power key to instantly lock the phone.

### Secured with password

- Lock screen widgets locks the widgets displayed on the home screens.
- Lock automatically: The screen automatically locks a defined period of time after the screen turns off.
- Lock instantly with power key: press the power key to instantly lock the phone.

## **Display Settings**

Use this menu to change display settings.

- - Wallpaper: set the Wallpaper for the Home screen, Lock screen, or both. For more information, refer to "Wallpaper" on page 39.
  - Notification panel: set the notification panel brightness level and also select the quick setting buttons to display at the top of the notification panel. For more information, refer to "Notifications" on page 32.
  - Multi window: tap this option to enable/disable the automatic Multi window feature. For more information, refer to "Multi Window Feature" on page 30.
  - Screen mode: allows you to select from several different color modes.
  - **Brightness**: configures the LCD Brightness levels. Tap Automatic brightness to allow the phone to self-adjust or drag the slider and tap **OK**.

- Auto-rotate screen: allows you to switch the display orientation automatically when you rotate the phone.
- Screen timeout: adjusts the delay time before the screen automatically turns off. Selections are: 15 seconds, 30 seconds, 1 minute, 2 minutes, 5 minutes, and 10 minutes.
- Daydream: allows you to control what your screen does when your device is docked or sleeping. Tap the OFF / ON icon next to Daydream to turn it on . Follow the on-screen instructions.
- Font style: set the font style used on the phone display. Touch Get fonts online to choose from a wider selection.
- Font size: select the size of the font the phone displays.

#### More display settings

This option configure brightness levels and sets up the quick setting buttons (icons) that display in the notification panel.

#### Selecting Quick Setting buttons

Customize which quick setting buttons display at the top of the notification panel.

## **LED Indicator**

The LED indicator on the front of the phone displays when the phone is locked, to notify you of status changes and events. Use LED indicator settings to configure how the LED functions.

   My device → LED indicator.
- 2. Select options:
  - Charging: When enabled, the LED glows red when the phone is connected to a charger and charging, and blinks red when the phone is connected to a charger and there is a problem with charging. When enabled, the LED glows green when the phone is connected to a charger and the battery is fully charged.

- Low battery: When enabled, the LED blinks red when battery power is low and the phone is not connected to charger.
- Notifications: When enabled, the LED blinks blue for missed call, messages or other notifications.
- Voice recording: When enabled, the LED glows blue when recording while the screen is off.

### Volume

Set the system volume level, and set default volume for call ringtones, notifications, and media playback.

Note: You can also set System volume from the Home screen by pressing the Volume Key.

- To create your own pattern, touch Create. Touch Tap to create in the pattern; then touch Stop. Touch Save to save your pattern.

### **Notifications**

Choose a default sound to play for notifications, such as for new messages and event reminders.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Sound → Notifications.

#### Vibrate when ringing

The phone vibrates when it is ringing.

### **System Sound Settings**

Use System sound settings to configure the dialing pad, make a screen selection, or lock or tap your screen.

  - **Dialing keypad tone**: sound plays when you touch a key on the keyboard.
  - Touch sounds: sound plays when you touch the screen.

  - Haptic feedback: vibrates to indicate screen touches and on certain UI interactions.
  - Emergency tone: determines whether the phone plays an alert, or vibrates as an Emergency alert.

## **Power saving mode**

  - **CPU power saving**: When enabled, the device's maximum performance is limited. This does not affect normal usage, such as browsing and video playback.
  - Screen power saving: When enabled, the screen uses reduced frame refresh rate and lower brightness.
  - Turn off haptic feedback: When enabled, Haptic feedback is turned off, and no vibration plays when you touch the screen.

# **Accessibility Settings**

Your phone offers features to make using the phone easier for those with certain physical disabilities. Use the Accessibility settings to activate these services.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Accessibility.
- 2. The following options are available:
  - Auto-rotate screen: when enabled, the screen's orientation automatically changes when you rotate the phone.
  - Screen timeout: set the length of delay between the last key press or screen touch and the automatic screen timeout (dim and lock).
  - **Speak passwords**: when enabled, you can speak passwords for log-ins.
  - Answering/ending calls: when enabled you press the home key to accept incoming calls, or press the power key to end an incoming call.
  - Show shortcut: press and hold the power key to access the accessibility shortcut listed under device options.

 Manage accessibility: save and update accessibility settings or share them with another device. You can export your settings, import a previously saved file, or share your file with another device.

#### Services

• **TalkBack**: when installed, activates the TalkBack feature which speaks feedback to help blind and low-vision users.

Important! TalkBack can collect all of the text you enter, except passwords, including personal data and credit card numbers. It may also log your user interface interactions with the device.

#### Vision settings

- Font size: change the size of the fonts used on the device within menus, options, and more. Selections are: Tiny, Small, Normal, Large, or Huge.
- Magnification gestures: use exaggerated gestures such as triple-tapping, double pinching, and dragging two fingers across the screen.

- Negative colors: reverses the on-screen color display from White text on a Black background to Black text on a White background.
- Color adjustment: adjust the display colors if you are color blind and have difficulty reading the display because of the colors. Touch and slide the slider to the right to activate the feature, then follow the on-screen instructions.
- Accessibility shortcut: when enabled, a link to Accessibility settings displays on the Device options menu, which displays when you press and hold the Power/Lock Key. This provides quick access to accessibility settings, to make changes as you use the phone.
- e : provides audible readout of text for incoming calls. For more information, refer to "*Speech*" on page 160.
- Enhance web accessibility: allows apps to install scripts from Google that make their Web content more accessible. Tap Allow.

#### **Hearing settings**

- **Sound balance**: allows you to use the slider to set the Left and Right balance when using a stereo device.
- Mono audio: allows you to enable stereo audio to be compressed into a single mono audio stream for use with a single earbud/earphone.
- Turn off all sounds: allows you to mute every sound made by the device during taps, selections, notifications, etc.
- Flash notification: allows you to set your camera light to blink whenever you receive a notification.

#### **Mobility settings**

- Assistant menu: allows you to improve the device accessibility for users with reduced dexterity. Touch and slide the slider to the right to turn it on 
   Internet of the onscreen instructions.
- Tap and hold delay: allows you to select a time interval for this action. Choose from: Short, Medium, or Long.

#### **Recognition settings**

 Interaction control: allows you to enable or disable motions and screen timeout. You can also block areas of the screen from touch interaction. Touch and slide the slider to the right to turn it on <a href="https://www.enable.com">www.enable.com</a> . Follow the on-screen instructions.

# Language and input

### Language

Set the language used by your phone's screens.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch  $\blacksquare$  Apps  $\rightarrow$  Settings then touch  $\blacksquare$  My device  $\rightarrow$  Language and input  $\rightarrow$ Language.
- 2. Select a language from the list.

### **Personal dictionary**

Create and manage a list of words for use in text entry, for matching your key touches with words.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Language and input → Personal dictionary.
- 2. Manage your word list:
  - Select + to enter new words.
  - Touch a word to Edit the word.
  - $\bullet$  Touch a word and tap  $\stackrel{\frown}{=}$  to delete it.

### **Keyboards and input methods**

Configure text entry options to your preferences.

### Default

Choose the default method for entering text. From the factory, the default method is Samsung keyboard. If you install other text entry apps, you can set them as default here.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Language and input → Default.
- 2. Touch an input method.

## **Google voice typing settings**

Configure Google voice input settings. When you enable Google voice in Settings, it is available for text entry when you touch a text field to enter text.

For more information, see *"Using Google Voice Typing"* on page 42.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Language and input.
- 2. Touch Google voice typing to enable it.

- Touch the beside Google voice typing to configure options:
  - Choose input languages: Select languages for Google voice typing. Select Automatic to use the Default language exclusively, or choose other language(s).
  - Block offensive words: When enabled, words many people find offensive are not shown in results of Google voice searches. Offensive words are replaced in results with a placeholder (#####).
  - **Download offline speech recognition**: Install a language module for Google voice recognition.

## Samsung keyboard

Configure Samsung keypad settings. When you enable Samsung keyboard in Settings, it is available for text entry when you touch a text field to enter text.

- From the Home screen, touch Apps → Settings then touch My device → Language and input.
- 2. Samsung keyboard is enabled by default. Touch 🏠 to configure options:

- **Portrait keyboard types**: Choose the default keypad when the screen is in portrait mode, from Qwerty or 3x4 keyboard (similar to a phone keypad).
- Input languages: Select languages for the Samsung keyboard.

Tip: When you have more than one language selected, you can slide your finger on the space bar while entering text to switch languages.

- Predictive text: Touch to enable predictive text, to have predictive text suggest words matching your text entries and optionally, complete common words automatically. Touch Predictive text to configure options:
  - Personalized data: Use added personal language to make prediction results more accurate.
  - Learn from Facebook: When logged in to Facebook, the phone learns from your Facebook style.
  - Learn from Gmail: When logged in to Gmail, the phone learns from your Gmail style.
  - Learn from Twitter: When logged in to Twitter, the phone learns from your Twitter style.

- Learn from Messaging: Allows the phone to learn from your Messages.
- Learn from Contacts: Allows the phone to learn from your Contacts.
- Clear remote data: Deletes anonymous data stored on the personalization server.
- Clear personal data: Removes all entered personalized data.
- Privacy: displays SwiftKey<sup>®</sup> privacy policies.
- Swiftkey flow: Swipe between letters to type words without lifting your finger off the keyboard.
- **Cursor control**: Move the cursor by sliding your finger across the keyboard.
- Handwriting:
  - Recognition type: Recognizes handwriting by the type of strokes used or completely recognizes handwriting no matter what type of stroke is used.
  - Recognition time: Defines the amount of time allotted for the phone to recognize handwriting.
  - Pen thickness: Defines the pen thickness to use.
  - Pen color: Defines the pen color to use.

- About: Displays the version of handwriting software used on this phone.
- Advanced: Displays advanced options:
  - Auto capitalization: Automatically capitalizes the first letter of the first word in each sentence (standard English style).
  - Auto spacing: Automatically inserts spaces between words.
  - Auto-punctuate: When enabled, a period and space are automatically entered to end a sentence, when you tap the space bar twice.
  - Character preview: Displays a preview of the current character selection in the text string. For example, when multiple characters are available for one key.
  - Key-tap vibration: When enabled, a vibration plays for your key touches.
  - Key-tap sound: When enabled, a sound plays for your key touches.
- Help: Displays help information for the Samsung keyboard, handwriting, handwriting gestures, and continuous input.
- **Reset settings**: Touch to reset Samsung keyboard settings to the defaults, except for My word list and the Auto substitution list.

## Swype

• Bluetooth headset: Records audio through the Bluetooth headset (if available).

#### **Text-to-speech options**

Text-to-speech (TTS) provides audible readout of text, for example, the contents of text messages, and the Caller ID for incoming calls.

### Motion

This device is capable of operating in Wi-Fi mode in the 2.4 and 5 GHz bands. The FCC requires that devices operating within 5.15-5.25 GHz may only be used indoors, not outside, in order to avoid interference with Mobile Satellite Services (MSS). Therefore, do not use this device outside as a Wi-Fi hotspot or in Wi-Fi Direct mode outside when using the 5.15-5.25 GHz band.

This section outlines the safety precautions associated with using your phone. The terms "mobile device" or "cell phone" are used in this section to refer to your phone. **Read this information before using your mobile device**.

#### Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published information for consumers relating to Radio Frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

#### Do cell phones pose a health hazard?

Many people are concerned that cell phone radiation will cause cancer or other serious health hazards. The weight of scientific evidence has not linked cell phones with any health problems. Cell phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Over the past 15 years, scientists have conducted hundreds of studies looking at the biological effects of the radio frequency energy emitted by cell phones. While some researchers have reported biological changes associated with RF energy, these studies have failed to be replicated. The majority of studies published have failed to show an association between exposure to radio frequency from a cell phone and health problems.

The low levels of RF cell phones emit while in use are in the microwave frequency range. They also emit RF at substantially reduced time intervals when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects.

The biological effects of radio frequency energy should not be confused with the effects from other types of electromagnetic energy. Very high levels of electromagnetic energy, such as is found in X-rays and gamma rays, can ionize biological tissues. Ionization is a process where electrons are stripped away from their normal locations in atoms and molecules. It can permanently damage biological tissues including DNA, the genetic material.

The energy levels associated with radio frequency energy, including both radio waves and microwaves, are not great enough to cause ionization of atoms and molecules.

Therefore, RF energy is a type of non-ionizing radiation. Other types of non-ionizing radiation include visible light, infrared radiation (heat), and other forms of electromagnetic radiation with relatively low frequencies.

While RF energy does not ionize particles, large amounts can increase body temperatures and cause tissue damage. Two areas of the body, the eyes and the testes, are particularly vulnerable to RF heating because there is relatively little blood flow in them to carry away excess heat.

#### **Research Results to Date: Is there a connection between RF and certain health problems?**

The results of most studies conducted to date say no. In addition, attempts to replicate and confirm the few studies that have shown a connection have failed.

The scientific community at large therefore believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community has supported additional research to address gaps in knowledge. Some of these studies are described below.

#### **Interphone Study**

Interphone is a large international study designed to determine whether cell phones increase the risk of head and neck cancer. A report published in the International Journal of Epidemiology (June, 2010) compared cell phone usage for more than 5,000 people with brain tumors (glioma and meningioma) and a similar number of healthy controls.

Results of this study did NOT show that cell phones caused brain cancer. In this study, most people had no increased risk of brain cancer from using cell phones. For people with the heaviest use of cell phones (an average of more than ½ hour per day, every day, for over 10 years) the study suggested a slight increase in brain cancer. However, the authors determined that biases and errors prevented any conclusions being drawn from this data. Additional information about Interphone can be found at

Interphone is the largest cell phone study to date, but it did not answer all questions about cell phone safety. Additional research is being conducted around the world, and the FDA continues to monitor developments in this field.

### International Cohort Study on Mobile Phone Users (COSMOS)

The COSMOS study aims to conduct long-term health monitoring of a large group of people to determine if there are any health issues linked to long-term exposure to radio frequency energy from cell phone use. The COSMOS study will follow approximately 300,000 adult cell phone users in Europe for 20 to 30 years. Additional information about the COSMOS study can be found at

#### Risk of Brain Cancer from Exposure to Radio Frequency Fields in Childhood and Adolescence (MOBI-KIDS)

MOBI-KIDS is an international study investigating the relationship between exposure to radio frequency energy from communication technologies including cell phones and brain cancer in young people. #### Surveillance, Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER) Program of the National Cancer Institute

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) actively follows cancer statistics in the United States to detect any change in rates of new cases for brain cancer. If cell phones play a role in risk for brain cancer, rates should go up, because heavy cell phone use has been common for quite some time in the U.S. Between 1987 and 2005, the overall age-adjusted incidence of brain cancer did not increase. #### **Cell Phone Industry Actions**

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the cell phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support-needed research on possible biological effects of RF for the type of signal emitted by cell phones;
- Design cell phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user; and

• Cooperate in providing users of cell phones with the current information on cell phone use and human health concerns.

The FDA also is working with voluntary standard-setting bodies such as the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection (ICNIRP), and others to assure that safety standards continue to adequately protect the public.

#### Reducing Exposure: Hands-Free Kits and Other Accessories

#### **Steps to Reduce Exposure to Radio Frequency Energy**

If there is a risk from being exposed to radio frequency energy (RF) from cell phones - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But, if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your RF exposure.

- Reduce the amount of time spent using your cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between your head and the cell phone.

#### Hands-Free Kits

Hands-free kits may include audio or Bluetooth<sup>®</sup> headsets and various types of body-worn accessories such as belt-clips and holsters. Combinations of these can be used to reduce RF energy absorption from cell phones.

Headsets can substantially reduce exposure because the phone is held away from the head in the user's hand or in approved body-worn accessories. Cell phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet RF exposure compliance requirements when used against the head and against the body.

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used for convenience and comfort. They are also required by law in many states if you want to use your phone while driving.

# Cell Phone Accessories that Claim to Shield the Head from RF Radiation

Because there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories which claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone.

Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hands-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption.

#### **Children and Cell Phones**

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to any users of cell phones from RF exposure, including children and teenagers. The steps adults can take to reduce RF exposure apply to children and teenagers as well.

- Reduce the amount of time spent on the cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between the head and the cell phone.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using cell phones at all. For example, The Stewart Report from the United Kingdom made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report, a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

#### Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) Certification Information

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for Radio Frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government.

These FCC RF exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations: the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The RF exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg).

The FCC SAR limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum reported value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the SAR limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. For body-worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the mobile device a minimum of 1.0cm from the body.

Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines. The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile device with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. #### **On the Road - Off the Phone**

The primary responsibility of every driver is the safe operation of his or her vehicle.

Responsible drivers understand that no secondary task should be performed while driving whether it be eating, drinking, talking to passengers, or talking on a mobile phone - unless the driver has assessed the driving conditions and is confident that the secondary task will not interfere with their primary responsibility. **Do not engage in any activity while driving a moving vehicle which may cause you to take your eyes off the road or become so absorbed in the activity that your ability to concentrate on the act of driving becomes impaired**. Samsung is committed to promoting responsible driving and giving drivers the tools they need to understand and address distractions.

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. For example, only hands-free use may be permitted in certain areas.

Before answering calls, consider your circumstances. Let the call go to voicemail when driving conditions require. Remember, driving comes first, not the call!

If you consider a call necessary and appropriate, follow these tips:

- Use a hands-free device;
- Secure your phone within easy reach;
- Place calls when you are not moving;
- Plan calls when your car will be stationary;
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations;
- Let the person with whom you are speaking know that you are driving and will suspend the call if necessary;
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving;

#### **Battery Use and Safety**

# Important! Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage. Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries and, particularly, from the continued use of damaged batteries.

• Do not disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery. Do not put a high degree of pressure on the battery. This can cause leakage or an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.

- Do not let the phone or battery come in contact with liquids. Liquids can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. Even when the phone appears to be dry and appears to operate normally, the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard. #### Keep your Samsung Mobile Device away from:

#### Liquids of any kind

Keep the mobile device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If the mobile device does get wet, do not accelerate drying with the use of an oven, microwave, or dryer, because this may damage the mobile device and could cause a fire or explosion.

Do not use the mobile device with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the mobile device.

#### Extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below  $0^\circ\text{C}$  /  $32^\circ\text{F}$  or above  $45^\circ\text{C}$  /  $113^\circ\text{F}.$ 

#### Microwaves

#### Caution! Avoid potential hearing loss.

Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cell phones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth<sup>®</sup> or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound, and distorted hearing. Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings, and equipment.

You should follow some common sense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Always turn the volume down before plugging the earphones into an audio source.
- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- Be aware that you can adapt to higher volume settings over time, not realizing that the higher volume may be harmful to your hearing.

- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech, or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

#### **Operating Environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area, and always switch your mobile device off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the mobile device or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

### Using Your Mobile Device Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from Radio Frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless mobile device. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### **Implantable Medical Devices**

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless mobile device and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.

Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON;
- · Should not carry the mobile device in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the mobile device OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place;

 Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your wireless mobile device with an implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

#### **Other Medical Devices**

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your mobile device off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

#### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle before using your mobile device in a motor vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### **Posted Facilities**

Switch your mobile device off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

#### **Potentially Explosive Environments**

Switch your mobile device off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Users are advised to switch the mobile device off while at a refueling point (service station).

Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

#### When your Device is Wet

Do not turn on your device if it is wet. If your device is already on, turn it off and remove the battery immediately (if the device will not turn off or you cannot remove the battery, leave it as-is). Then, dry the device with a towel and take it to a service center.

#### FCC Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

The U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has established requirements for digital wireless mobile devices to be compatible with hearing aids and other assistive hearing devices.

When individuals employing some assistive hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants) use wireless mobile devices, they may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and mobile devices also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless mobile devices to assist hearing device users find mobile devices that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all mobile devices have been rated. Mobile devices that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated mobile device successfully. Trying out the mobile device with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

**M-Ratings**: Wireless mobile devices rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. M-ratings refer to enabling acoustic coupling with hearing aids that do not operate in telecoil mode.


**T-Ratings:** Mobile devices rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than mobile devices that are not labeled. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. T-ratings refer to enabling inductive coupling with hearing aids operating in telecoil mode.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing aid manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise.

Under the current industry standard, American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19, the hearing aid and wireless mobile device rating values are added together to indicate how usable they are together. For example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless mobile device meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equals M5.

Under the standard, this should provide the hearing aid user with normal use while using the hearing aid with the particular wireless mobile device. A sum of 6 or more would indicate excellent performance.

However, these are not guarantees that all users will be satisfied. T ratings work similarly.



The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

#### **HAC for Newer Technologies**

This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing aids for some of the wireless technologies that it uses. However, there may be some newer wireless technologies used in this phone that have not been tested yet for use with hearing aids. It is important to try the different features of this phone thoroughly and in different locations, using your hearing aid or cochlear implant, to determine if you hear any interfering noise. Consult your service provider or the manufacturer of this phone for information on hearing aid compatibility. If you have questions about return or exchange policies, consult your service provider or phone retailer.

#### FCC Notice and Cautions

#### **FCC Notice**

The mobile device may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the mobile device if such interference cannot be eliminated. Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association.

#### Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your mobile device not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas, and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the mobile device warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the mobile device.

Although your mobile device is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.

#### **Other Important Safety Information**

- Only qualified personnel should service the mobile device or install the mobile device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Ensure that any mobile devices or related equipment installed in your vehicle are securely mounted.
- Check regularly that all wireless mobile device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- When using a headset in dry environments, static electricity can build up in the headset and cause a small quick static electrical shock. To minimize the risk of electrostatic discharge from the headset avoid using the headset in extremely dry environments or touch a grounded unpainted metal object to discharge static electricity before inserting the headset.

- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the mobile device, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment near or in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

- Reduce risk of repetitive motion injuries. When you repetitively
  perform actions, such as pressing keys, drawing characters on a
  touch screen with your fingers, or playing games, you may

  periods, hold the device with a relaxed grip, press the keys lightly,
  and take frequent breaks. If you continue to have discomfort

#### What is covered and for how long?
